Berkeley Lake's Earth Day will be Saturday, April 27 from 9:00 AM until 2:00 PM. City staff will be on hand at City Hall, along with vendors and volunteers to assist you with shredding documents, disposal of unwanted items and recycling of others. Advanced Disposal will be accepting yard waste and large household items such as desks, mattresses, box springs, etc. Lott Bolden will be accepting scrap metal, appliances, lawn mowers, grills, car and truck batteries, and other metal items and electronics but there will be a charge of \$10.00 - \$50.00 for TVs, depending on size. Iron Mountain will provide onsite shredding. The Rice Settlage Team will sponsor this event for the third year in a row, so please thank Jill and Tracey when you see them. Remember that this service is provided by the City of Berkeley Lake at no cost only to citizens, so bring your identification showing a Berkeley Lake address in order to dispose of or recycle items. The following items will not be accepted: construction debris, wet paints, entire trees, and tires. You may dispose of a television without additional charge by calling Advanced Disposal at (678) 495-0058 to make arrangements with them to pick the television up at your home.
