- **Nights Out**: Attending concerts, evening lectures, movies or shows, botanical gardens and more.
- Outdoor Adventurers: Walking, water activities, hiking and biking.



I cannot note the passing of each citizen but I want to pay special honor to **Dick Lillie** who left this life on Christmas Day at the age of 96. Dick served our Navy in WW2 aboard an aircraft carrier and survived two kamikaze attacks on May 11, 1945, during the Battle of Okinawa. He was forced to

abandon ship in shark infested waters and was rescued five hours later by a destroyer. In spite of that experience he continued to love the sea, taking his yacht the "Ebb Tide" up and down the

Atlantic and riding out hurricanes. I will remember Dick fondly as something of a hurricane himself and loved to listen to the stories he shared at some of our city's Memorial Day events. He loved the home he made on our lake with his wife Gia, an outstanding artist who passed before him. He built this lighthouse there at the water's edge. Dick was buried at the National Cemetery in Canton, Georgia on January 9, 2020 with full military honors, and he will be missed here in Berkeley Lake.



I want to thank the citizens of River District who came out on Christmas Day to pick up trash that had been dumped on Berkeley Lake Road. It is thought that someone had taken a bag of trash from a dumpster just outside our city to search for information that could be used for identity theft and then left the trash strewn along the roadside. Remember we have the shredder truck coming as always to Berkeley Lake's Earth Day and protect your information until then. At the good suggestion of Carol Seitz, I recently asked for and received a meeting with county officials at **Pinckneyville Park** to review their offerings in **recreational activities for adults**. June Spruell went with me and we were both pleasantly surprised at all that is available right here in our city. See below for adult and senior clubs/groups. All clubs are free and open to the public.

• VanGo Trip on February 5: VanGo is a senior monthly trip to different art venues in Metro Atlanta like the High Museum, Art Fairs, The Convention Center Folk Art Festival and plays. This particular trip is to the Art Station, located in Stone Mountain, to see the play 'Mama Makes

Up Her Mind'. It is a senior matinee performance at 10:30 AM and with transportation the total cost for the trip is \$18. After the play, they will stop for lunch before heading back to Pinckneyville.

- **Bridge:** Bridge is a card game that has grown here to include 36-40 seniors each Thursday from 9:45 AM-2:30 PM. They bring lunch and enjoy social time while playing.
- Book Club: They pick a book and then discuss it at the meetings. They have gone to using
 the center on a rotating basis as some of the members wanted to meet at their house
 instead.
- **Gourd Group:** They make art out of gourds and meet the 2nd Saturday of every month from 10:00 AM-3:00 PM.
- **Photography Club:** This meets the 2nd Tuesday of the month from 7:00-9:00 PM for lessons on how to take better photos.

Pinckneyville also hosts a **pottery studio**.

- Monday is Wheel (Intermediate) from 6:30 PM-9:00 PM
- Tuesday is Advanced Wheel from 6:30 PM-9:00 PM
- Wednesday is Wheel/Handbuilding (Beginners) from 10:30 AM-1:00 PM
- Thursday is Handbuilding (Beginners) from 6:30 PM-9:00 PM

All of these classes are \$121 for a 6-week session for ages 16-up. Open studio hours are also available. Contact the center for more information.



The center also has large and attractive meeting spaces, a dance studio, and so many other interesting activities that June and I were frankly amazed. The staff members were most accommodating and if you have suggestions, they will try to make them happen. I hope more of our citizens will begin to explore over there and enjoy this valuable amenity. The county is planning to dig up **South Berkeley Lake Road** soon to **replace a major water main**. When I find out more, I will let you know but be on the lookout for this major construction project to begin soon.

I got another good citizen suggestion from Chet McQuaide who wondered if I might get the county elections officials to come out and **demonstrate the new voting machines** before they go into use. They have responded by setting up a demonstration for us at **Pinckneyville Community**

Center on **Saturday, February 1 at 10:00 AM**. I asked for a Saturday morning because I thought that would be easiest for our people to get to and I hope Chet and I are not the only ones there since they're going to all this trouble. Come out and join us. A lot has been said and written recently about these new machines, so now we can see for ourselves.

This is a good time to remind everybody about **invasive plants**. Nandinas are so pretty with their red berries this time of the year, but they can be lethal to birds. See here for more information. Also, it's a good time to be removing English ivy from your yards and especially trees, which it will kill. English ivy is the favorite place of snakes and mosquitoes, neither of which are out too much now so it's easier to get after that ivy before it warms up.
