those. You made our officers feel great, as well as the kids who received the stuff they needed to start the year off right!

I am pleased to report to you that our **City Council recently approved a lowered millage rate which I and our Citizen Finance Committee recommended of 1.348 mills.** As an example, for a home with a fair market value of \$725,000 in 2022, the city property tax was \$421.95. For a home of the same value in 2023, the tax will be \$390.92, which represents a **7.35% reduction in taxes year to year.**

In other **important information about the city's finances**, we always open all our information (financial and otherwise) yearly to an outside independent auditor. James L Whitaker, CPA of Snellville, Ga. spent a great deal of time studying everything about how our city functions and produced a 38-page report, which, of course, like all our other information is available to citizens who would like to study it. He professed himself to be quite impressed with our financial procedures and position, noting that "the City of Berkeley Lake has no long-term debt" and "continues to maintain a healthy financial position." Also: "The 2023 budget reflects continued use of American Rescue Plan Act funds, which thus far have primarily been used for stormwater infrastructure improvements. The City continues to expend general, SPLOST, and ARPA funds in the operations of its own stormwater management program." He remarked upon this because it's unusual, since most cities collect stormwater infrastructure fees from all homeowners and businesses. As you know, we have continued to be able to avoid that.

Our city has scheduled an **election for November 7**, 2023, to fill the expiring terms of mayor and 2 council members. Bob Smith, Rebecca Spitler, and I are all committed to continue in serving you if that is your wish and will put our names on the ballot. If you would like to run also, please stop by City Hall between the hours of 9 AM and 4 PM Monday, August 21 to Wednesday, August 23. There you will be able to pay the necessary qualifying fee of \$150 for mayor or \$27 for city council. Advance in person voting will be available in City Hall from 9 AM until 5 PM on the following dates: October 16-21, October 23-28, and October 30 through November 3. On November 7 the polls will be open in City Hall from 7 AM until 7 PM. If there is a runoff, it will take place on December 5. If you need to register to vote in this election, you need to do that on or before October 10. As you can see, we will need a lot of help to manage all these hours of the election process, so, if you are able to help, please contact Leigh Threadgill who is our election superintendent and absentee ballot clerk. She can answer any questions about the election process.



Along with council members Rebecca Spitler, Bob Smith, Rodney Hammond, and Scott Lee, I recently visited the **new Gas South District** to check out the complete makeovers of the Convention Center, the Arena, and the addition of a new Westin Hotel which will open in February or March with 348 rooms, all kinds of amenities, and a rooftop bar. There's also a new park with a greenway walk and pretty wetlands. We heard all about the impact of the **film industry which brought \$4.4 billion into Gwinnett** last year. There are now 3 major film studios here and

520 "film friendly locations" with Norcross leading the way. The "Will Trent" and "Ozark" series have been filmed locally as well as 80 other shows. Berkmar and Meadowcreek high schools are training kids in all kinds of film support jobs through a liaison with a company called Fresh Films. With this kind of local economic impact, everybody is hoping that the strike (primarily regarding residuals and AI) will be resolved soon.




