In starting a new year, I want to remind everyone that City Council meeting agendas are posted on our website along with all the documents that relate to that agenda a full week in advance. This gives you all the information and time you will need to consider issues conveniently, to learn more about them, and possibly to come to the meeting to share your thoughts or concerns about things. After meetings, we publish on the website not only the written minutes, but also a voice recording that you can listen to in the comfort of your own home. Citizen participation is so important, and it's a great strength of our small city. The last three Planning and Zoning Commission meetings, and the last City Council meeting were all before "a packed house" of citizens, so clearly a lot of you are paying attention and are passionate about issues. If you couldn't make it to these meetings, don't worry, because you can still catch up. One of the things that makes me most proud of our city is the way we make it easy for our citizens (who are a very intelligent bunch) to hear every meeting (P&Z, City Council, etc.) at their convenience when they are too busy to attend in person. It's right there on the homepage of our website. Click City Council on the left, and you will see the availability to hear the voice record, see the agenda, and study every document related to our considerations. We also (in my opinion) have an unusually good City Council currently, and by knowing what's going on in advance, you have time to discuss issues with them and share your thoughts. Our next City Council meeting is at 8 PM on Thursday, February 8. Our City Attorney and our City Engineer have been booked to attend to answer questions and provide any clarification that may be needed.

Two things happen every year in January. One is that all of our council members, in effect, "renew their vows" publicly to certain principles of **civility in managing the business of our City**. The City Council got together some years ago with a consultant hired from UGA's Carl Vinson Institute of Government and worked hard to hash out a <u>Code of Conduct</u> which you can read here. It's important that we refocus on it at least yearly and commit to it again as we begin a new year. Our Code requires me or whoever is conducting a meeting to manage it in such a way that people disagree, when necessary, about ideas with courtesy and mutual respect. As I watch other

governmental entities descending into personal attacks, name-calling, or worse, I continue to be grateful for the way we work together to resolve difficulties in Berkeley Lake. I think this Code is something we can all be proud of.

> Volunteering is the ultimate exercise in democracy. You vote in elections once a year, but when you volunteer, you vote every day about the kind of community you want to live in.

Also, in January of each year I appoint willing citizens to **our city's committees**. These volunteers work hard all year, studying everything about our city's handling of money, working to plant trees and manage our beautiful natural spaces, etc. I recently read in a book by Max Lucado: "A 2010 study of more than 4500 American adults revealed that of the people who

volunteered an average of more than 100 hours per year, 68% reported feeling healthier. Also 73% said that volunteerism "lowered my stress levels," and 89% stated that service "has improved my sense of well-being." You may remember that you were all invited last fall in the Mayor's Message to let me know which committees, if any, you might be most interested in. As always, I was able to help everyone who volunteered to find a spot to serve. If not enough people volunteer, I wind up recruiting (i.e. begging) for help. The following people have one way or another accepted the call to serve you in the coming year, and I tremendously appreciate their contributions all year long. Please thank them when you see them.

interested are invited to attend this celebration of Arbor Day and our continuing achievement as a **Tree City.**

As many of you know, one of our City Marshals is a former professional firefighter. During the severe cold we had recently, he asked me to remind you **not to plug space heaters into power strips or household extension cords.** They are not designed for the amperage draw that a space heater can have and could cause a fire in your home. In my last Mayor's Message I talked about our **upcoming stormwater improvements project** which has been awarded to the Dickerson group. I like for you to know who the companies are that will be working in your neighborhoods and around your home so if you see a bunch of trucks and strange guys you can know who they are and why they are there. Unfortunately, the weather has delayed the beginning of these projects, but we hope to get that started next week. The locations are predominantly in Hermitage Plantation as a result of the last round of our stormwater inspections. In addition, a few other locations around Lakeshore Drive and River Mansions have been included as a result of issues identified by staff or citizens.
