Please remember our city's **Earth Day is this Saturday**, **April 20 from 10 AM to 2 PM**. Besides the usual two trucks from Waste Management and the shredder truck sponsored by Jill Rice and Tracey Settlage, we will also have Fully Furnished Ministries here to take reusable furniture and the metal recycling guy who will take a lot of stuff you might not think of - see below. It's good to keep all of this stuff out of the landfill.

Washers, dryers, water heaters
Microwaves and Metal signage
Lawn mowers, gym equipment

Junk cars, trailers, small aluminum / metal Jon boats
Car parts and batteries
Piping, sink faucets & fittings
Outdoor furniture and grills
DVD players, VCRs, gaming systems
Cabinet knobs
Metal, computers, wire, old cords /wiring,
steel/copper/aluminum/brass
No TVs of any kind or furniture unless it's all metal

From our Police Precinct Commander, who is always very attentive and responsive to our needs: "Since January we have had a sharp increase in both commercial burglaries and car break-ins in the area. For the most part they have avoided Berkeley Lake. We started a Crime Suppression Task Force last month to address this and it has been very successful. We will get these suspects in custody; hopefully sooner than later." I know you appreciate him and his officers as much as I do. He would like me to remind you to keep our cars locked and belongings always out of sight, to get to know and watch over our neighbors, and to call 911 as soon as you can with possible crime concerns giving as much information as you can. Some of you feel more comfortable calling or texting me with those kinds of concerns, which is fine because I want

to be helpful when I can, but understandably, and this is important, the police want to hear directly from a witness ASAP, not from someone who heard something secondhand. If you can give descriptions, tag numbers, time of day, and any other information, they will want to hear that directly from you, so don't be shy about calling 911 or the Police Nonemergency number which is 770-513-5700. And remember please to bring children's books to my office to help our officers on their book drive for kids who need them.

I'm so pleased to tell you that **Andy Anderson is now serving as our new Deputy City Marshal!** Many of you already know him and his wife Bonnie, who live in our city. Andy grew up on a farm helping from a young age, hunting and fishing the Mississippi River with nets and baskets, so he has a lifelong appreciation for our beautiful natural environment. At 18 he left home for Los Angeles and had a range of experiences in jobs and volunteer work. He is glad to have "found Bonnie" and they are very happy to be part of our BL community. He says he thinks it's "rare and wonderful to find such a kind group of people. We want to be part of this community that helps and accepts one another." Gotta say "Amen" to that!

Thanks to our hard-working City Marshal Rob Hiller, who stayed on the city of Duluth officials to get their **sign removed from North**

Berkeley Lake Road near Miramont. That was confusing to a lot of people, and it took a while to be resolved, but Rob stuck with it.
