From 10 AM until noon on that day you can bring your unneeded prescriptions to turn in to the drug take back police officer that we will have in attendance. You can bring all kinds of electronics that you no longer need for recycling. Our City Marshals

will help you offload those behind City Hall, and we will get them to a good place. You can meet and talk with the very consultants knowledgeable whom we have hired to review and update our zoning and development codes govern our city. You've heard me talk about this before; and I continue to want as many of you as possible to have input into this. The consultants held a pop-up event at the July 4 parade, and this is another opportunity for you. If you cannot make this one, you, of course, can still link to the project website to learn more about what is being considered and to give your input there. Transportation to answer your questions about the upcoming **Transit Referendum** which you will be voting on November 5. The Transit Plan includes over 75 projects that could provide transit access to every citizen and business in Gwinnett County, in addition to two shuttles directly to the airport. There is more information about the <u>Transit Referendum</u> and the <u>Transit Plan</u> that it would fund at these links, but it may be valuable for you to talk directly to the experts about this as you decide how you feel about this possible investment of your tax dollars. We wanted to make that available to you.

While thinking about the **November 5 General Election**, I want to remind you to check out the Secretary of State Office's My Voter Page (MVP). Here you can find polling information, view a sample ballot, and more. I always try to study the whole ballot before I go. Our votes are important and deserving of some thoughtful advance consideration. Registered voters can begin advance in-person voting any day including weekends from **October 15 through November 1, 7 AM to 7 PM**.

While I'm thinking of firefighters, here is a reminder: fall is a good time to change your smoke alarms.

We are all so grateful to the **Georgia Power team** that has worked in our community and around the state recently repairing power lines from the hurricane. As it happened, I had just met a few weeks before the storm with some of their management leaders in response to concerns from one of our homeowner association presidents. I had invited them to come and meet with me, Rob Hiller, and Leigh Threadgill in City Hall to talk about the fact that we have so many power outages and to ask what could be done about that, if anything. Georgia Power sent not only their Metro Regional Manager but also their Engineering Supervisor for Gwinnett and their Forester/tree expert. He explained that the challenge in our city is all the huge, beautiful trees that are so treasured here. As storms are getting stronger with climate changes, these old trees sometimes constrict their roots during droughts, which makes them more likely to fall and take power lines with them. I have explored the cost of burying power lines in the past and it is shockingly expensive. Our trees, of course, do help us a lot by slowing down water runoff in severe rains. Georgia Power agreed to come and survey our whole city for possible tree problems in our right-of-way. I agreed to caution all of you to please have your trees checked regularly by an arborist to see which ones may be rotten inside. **Call City Hall if you need to make arrangements for removal within our guidelines. That number is 770-368-9484.**

They have already delivered four full trucks and trailers to locations in NC and GA, and the requests from rescues and shelters are coming in fast.
