I continue to be excited about our city's code update project. I'm beginning to be concerned that some of you are passing up multiple opportunities to give us your input. This stuff is going to be important to you at some point, and I so very much want you to have a say in its development. The top notch consultants that we hired have reviewed our current regulations, toured the city with staff, conducted citizen stakeholder interviews, held a July 4 event to garner personal feedback on hot topics, drafted a diagnostic report to clarify the types of issues that need to be addressed in the code



update, and hosted a public meeting (seen here) on October 26 to gain public input on key policy issues. Those attending gave their opinions in writing on things like senior housing, accessory dwelling units, expanding housing options, commercial and residential design standards, and sign regulations. For those who couldn't attend the public meeting on October 26, you can participate virtually by taking this survey so that your feedback can inform the types of regulations that will be drafted.
